A NEW SUBSTATION

A ribbon cutting ceremony on October 11, 2007 launched the opening of the Grapeland Heights Substation. In attendance (from left) to right in photo) were City Manager Pedro G. The substation, scheduled to operate twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, will house the Accident Investigations, Crime Suppression, Special Events, Patrol Support, and Specialized Patrol Units. Citizens in the area will be able to file a criminal report, request for police and receive other city services such as completing a delayed accident report. Flagami residents who attended the ceremony expressed their happiness with the station in their neighborhood. Aside from the services available at Grapeland Heights, residents are pleased to know that there will be more police presence.



A FIGHT AGAINST TERRORISM

After its inception on November 25th, 2005, Miami Shield has metamorphosed into several components aimed to address terrorism. One example was the "Seven Signs of Terrorism," that helped citizens recognize the signs of a potential terrorist target as they went about their every day activities. In June of 2007, during the Global Initiative to Combat Nuclear Terrorism Conference, the Office of Emergency Management and Homeland Security (O.E.M.) announced the latest Miami Shield project, "The See Something, Say Something" campaign. Symbolized by a black Labrador with a collar and badge, the Miami campaign was the first in the State of Florida to adopt the program.

By way of televised commercials and billboards, residents commuting via local transit and highways were now more savvy about what to look for in a potential terrorist. The success of these programs was due to the many efforts of O.E.M., under the command of Captain Richard Walterman.

Fortunately, Officer Wing has been medically discharged, however Officer New will require many months of rehabilitation to get back on his feet. I wish him the best during his convalescence and encourage you to pay him a visit when you get a moment.

As you read through the pages of this quarterly, you will get a glimpse of the noble projects the men and women of the Miami Police Department carry out on a daily basis. I take this opportunity to recognize the members of the Community Relations Section whose work, on behalf of the underprivileged, ill and forgotten members of our community, is multiplied during the holidays. Also, allow me to congratulate the Specialized Operations Section who will call the Grapeland Heights Substation home in 2008 after building renovations are completed.


