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MIAMI POLICE RECOGNIZED BY I.A.C.P.



This special recognition from this prestigious law enforcement organization is a special tribute to Miami Police employees and an honor for this municipality. "It is evident that our efforts to work with the citizens of the City of Miami to create a safer environment are not only successful, but

admired by some of the highest, most respected authorities in the policing arena," said Chief of Police Miguel Exposito. "The fact that the Miami Police Department was selected out of over 18,000 police departments in the United States, makes this something we can all be proud of," he added. The Miami Police Department was officially presented with the I.A.C.P. Homeland Security Special Recognition Award for the 2010 Community Police Awards during their annual banquet on October 27, 2010, in Orlando, Florida.


GROVE BED RACE

The investigation focused on the Liberty Square Projects in response to the relentless gang related shootings that were occurring in the area.
